CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Through a dedicated workforce we were able to pivot as required to address situations arising out of the ever-changing variants of Covid and government changes to how Aotearoa manages each variant. Whether it required staff to work remotely from home or those who were on the front line the adaptability learnt from 2020 stood us in good stead. The website was constantly updated with the latest information from the Ministry of Health alongside the Trust's Face Book page. The team's approaches through relationships, their passion and commitment to the community we serve was outstanding.

The legislated Vaccination Order which came into effect in on the 23rd October with an implementation date on the 15th November 2021 proved to be very challenging both personally and professionally. Te Ao Hou Trust continues to operate in the black with a very robust working capital and no long-term debt. This is a credit not only to the Board but to all the staff and I am so appreciative of the awesome team we have at the Trust.

Finally, I look forward to the year ahead although it will still be challenging with the continued pandemic interrupting business as usual.

The Party at the Pa started off with a beautiful korero by Whaea Bettina Maxwell and Matua Buster about the history of Torere Marae tipuna whare and whare karakia. The day was a good way to get to know our whanau and share information around how Te Ao Hou Trust supports the community. Time was spent monitoring the tamariki on the bouncy castle, painting moko and handing out ice blocks making connections with the tamariki while their Kaiako spoke with our Whānau Ora Team. Also played games and participated in korikori tinana with the remainder of the tamariki while our Healthy Families team were able to ask all our tamariki what play looks like for them.

Suicide Intervention and Prevention Wananga

A beautiful day hosted by Emma Kutia for Rangatahi and whānau in Waimana speaking about suicide intervention and prevention. Everyone participated in activities suitable for all ages and created a korowai of aroha that we can wrap around ourselves to weather the storms of life.

Whānau used post it notes to show their different safe places and safe people, which was then layered to create a korowai. It was interesting as a lot of our whanau know these things consciously but rarely write it down or reflect on this often, and sometimes forget in the busyness and challenging times in life. Rangatahi spoke about taiao and whenua being a huge healing tool for them and the importance of going home when you're not ok.

Planting fruit trees as a physical symbol of the day and something our whānau can awhi and love so that they grow rounded off the day before sharing hakari together.

Emma's knowledge and how she facilitates and engages with whānau to korero on a very difficult subject provided a safe environment which was very much appreciated by those in attendance.


